

Village Newsletter Wins an Award!



Earlier this year Theydon Bois Parish Council took the decision to re-vamp its newsletter, which had been produced in its existing format for a number of years. A committee was formed consisting of three parish councillors, the parish clerk and the current editor. A plan of action was agreed which aimed for a period of evolution for 2003 with more changes to be made in 2004. In particular it is planned that the magazine will have more emphasis on village activities and local events to supplement reporting of the workings of the parish council.

Revisions began in April and the parish clerk, unbeknown to the newsletter committee, was so

confident of the improvements that, with the agreement of the Chairman, she entered the April edition into a competition organised by the Essex Association of Local Councils.

Towards the end of June the parish council were advised that they had won the category for small councils magazines and the Parish Clerk and myself attended the AGM of the Association, where we were presented with a commemorative plaque by Baroness Platt of Writtle. We were very pleased to receive the award which is a very good start to the revamping of the village news. Hopefully this will help us in our aim to obtain sponsorship to fund further improvements.

Report on Parish Council Meeting 31st July 2003

Present were Councillors J Eaton (Chair), K Cushing, R Glozier, P Gooch, M Hannibal, M O'Connor, J Padfield, S Powell and W Shales. Apologies for absence were received and accepted from Cllr Oliver and Cllr Smith.

The Minutes of the meeting on 22nd May, 2003 were confirmed as a correct record.

MATTERS ARISING

- It has been established that the lane leading down to the Old Foresters Club is the responsibility of EFDC.
- District Cllr Roy Newland to speak later in the meeting regarding the soil importation at Blunts Farm Golf Course.
- Should Tottenham Hotspur Football Club be interested in purchasing land behind the station on the Old Foresters site we have had an assurance from Lambourne Parish Council, and other Parish Councils who opposed the proposals at Abridge, that we can count on their support against any similar proposals for a Football Academy in Theydon Bois.

CORRESPONDENCE

The Clerk reported on the following:-

- A letter from Theydon Bois Village Association thanking the Parish Council for their donation of £1,650 towards upkeep of the Village Hall.
- A letter from Essex Police asking the Parish Council to work with them to identify
 public spirited individuals who would be prepared to act as Special Constables in
 the Village, providing they meet the recruitment standards of the Special
 Constabulary.
- A media release from Epping Forest District Council warning residents to beware of bogus contractors 'cold calling' at their property offering to tarmac driveways.
- A media release from Epping Forest District Council advising that the pest control service was re-introduced on 1st July. Residents should call Environmental Health if they have a problem. There is no charge for rats and cockroaches but all other pests are chargeable.
- A letter from Nick Eade, Head Forest Keeper at the Corporation of London thanking the Parish Council for their letter conveying their kind words and thoughts on his retirement.

ACCOUNTS & PAYMENTS

- The accounts up to 28th July, 2003, having previously been circulated, were approved.
- A final draft of the Annual Accounts for the Year ended 31st March, 2003, having previously been circulated to Members, were submitted to the Council for approval and adoption and these were properly proposed, seconded and carried unanimously.

STANDING ORDERS

A final draft of the revised Theydon Bois Parish Council Standing Orders, having previously been circulated to Members, was submitted to the Council for approval and adoption. This was properly proposed, seconded and carried unanimously.

PLANNING

- Cllr Gooch reported that the Parish Council continued to be concerned with the loss of bungalows in the village with permission regularly being granted by Epping Forest District Council for upper storey extensions.
- The Parish Council had objected to an application for a telephone mast at Thrifts Hall Farm. It continued to be the policy of the Council to register its objection to this type of application.
- An enforcement notice had been applied to stop the importation of materials on to the Blunts Farm site. Cllr Newland to provide further details later in the meeting.

ENVIRONMENT

- Cllr Eaton read out a report by Cllr Smith In using the lane from Abridge to Hobbs Cross it has been noticed that two CCTV cameras have been positioned at different points along the road together with a notice about fly-tipping and penalties. It appears that EFDC are taking the initiative on car dumping and rubbish dumping in the surrounding district with a pilot scheme designed to deter offenders. Cllr Smith had been unable on several occasions to contact the people responsible in the Highways department to find out more about the scheme. He asked Cllr Glozier, as portfolio holder for Highways and Engineering, if he could find out more about the scheme and keep the Council informed.
- The Council refuse tip at Luxborough Lane, Chigwell now require proof of residence in the Epping Forest District Council area before being allowed onto the site. Without such proof it would cost £3 to enter. A refund can be obtained from

Essex County Council on production of a receipt and proof of residence (i.e. Council Tax Bill, driving licence or utility bill). The reason for introducing this scheme is to recover some of the costs involved processing waste from people who do not live in the Essex area. A copy of the notice is being held by the Parish Clerk and an article about this matter will appear in the forthcoming edition of the Village News. At present this scheme only affects Luxborough Lane but it is suggested that identification is carried when visiting any site as it appears that there was no pre-warning from Essex Council or Epping Forest District Council about this change.

- Environmental Committee members have recently been sent drafts of the suggested Terms of Reference to be adopted by the Committee. This will be discussed at the next Environmental Committee meeting in mid-September, after which it is hoped that the finished article will be sent to all councillors prior to the Public Meeting at the end of September.
- The overall winner of the Best Kept Village Competition was Coggeshall, with Great Bentley winning for the second year running in the category in which Theydon Bois was entered. The winner of the Best Kept Churchyard competition was Dengy. We expect to receive the full results and our marking in August, after which we will review what our strong points are, strengthen our weak points and consider changes in the competition itself. Cllr Smith stated that he still considers Theydon Bois to be one of the nicest villages in Essex.
- The Green has looked very good this year and the designated conservation areas have added to the overall appearance. It has been well managed and the Council has received compliments from the community.

CEMETERY

- There has been an improvement to the standard of mowing at the cemetery and the gardener is keeping the area neat and tidy. Unfortunately, he has recently had an accident which will keep him out of action for some time. If anyone is able to deputise for him over the next couple of months would they please contact the Parish Clerk.
- Cllr Smith recorded his thanks to all those involved in making the planters look so good and also to all those who pick up litter.

TREE STRATEGY

•Cllr Shales reported that the Tree Strategy Publication had now been distributed to all households in the Village and had been favourably received by residents. Cllrs

Shales and Padfield had attended a seminar on housing development which showed the importance of maintaining the rural aspect of the village in association with Epping Forest Countrycare, Theydon Bois Rural Preservation Society, Corporation of London, the Tree Wardens and Chris Neiland.

•There are plans to have allocated sites for memorial trees and also fill in any gaps to improve the appearance of the street scene. The strategy is a five year plan and it is hoped that after the Parish Council elections next year that new councillors will carry on with what has been done up until now.

LITTER

Cllr Eaton reminded those present that there was a litter pick on Saturday 2nd August and appealed for as many volunteers as possible.

EMERGENCY RESPONSE GROUP

The Committee met in June and a number of improvements were agreed to our plan. Wansfell College has agreed, subject to board ratification, to become a recovery centre for the village in the event of an emergency and this is seen as a big advantage for the village, A meeting will be held soon with those villagers who have special skills which have been identified as especially useful in the event of a disaster.

REPORTS FROM REPRESENTATIVES

VILLAGE NEWS - (Not reproduced here as it is reported on the front page).

BUXTON TRUST

At a special meeting convened to canvas the feelings of Trust members should the Tennis Club decide to apply for Planning Approval for Floodlighting the voting was 8 in favour of the application going ahead with 1 against.

PARISH PASSENGER TRANSPORT REPRESENTATIVES

A meeting was held on 30th May. Wendy Jackson has recently been appointed as Passenger Liaison Manager. A complaints form and system of handling complaints has been introduced. Complaint forms can be obtained from the Parish Clerk and complaints or suggestions will be reviewed with Wendy Jackson in due course.

The bus route 500 has been replaced by route 200 on Sundays with a revised timetable of no service to Romford. Weekdays are not affected.

WEB SITE

Cllr O'Connor reported there is an average of 2000 hits per month on the web site, with the news page still being the most popular. The web site and the Village News

are always looking for new material. As a result of looking on the Web Site, an inner London School contacted Theydon Bois Primary School and as a result they have embarked on a joint project and two classes visited the village in early July. Many of the shops are on the web site and the Quality and Excellence Butchers now have carrier bags with the Theydon Bois web site address printed on them. Cllr O'Connor expressed her appreciation for the continued good work of Jim Watts in running the Web Site.

VANDALISM AND ANTI-SOCIAL BEHAVIOUR GROUP

- Cllr O'Connor reported that two members of the Group had visited the Primary School Years 5 and 6 and carried out a mini-youth audit to find out what the children wanted in terms of activities in the Village. Karate classes will be starting in the Village Hall in September for ages 5 years and upwards. Further details in the forthcoming newsletter.
- Following the success of the safety course held last year, another course is planned to take place in the Village Hall for residents of Theydon Bois, which will be free of charge.
- Abridge village had received funding for CCTV cameras, which has resulted in a reduction in crime. Installation of CCTV cameras will be considered by the Council in the coming months.
- The mobile police office recently held a home safety morning, which was well attended. The mobile police office gives the opportunity for anyone with concerns to speak to the police in person and residents are encouraged to make use of it.
- Cllr Glozier reported that Theydon Bois had been top of the list for making its
 own efforts and as a result had been given funding for the planned safety course
 mentioned by Cllr O'Connor. He expressed his appreciation to Cllr O'Connor for
 her work in moving ideas forward and in particular to Sarah Hannibal, a young
 person who had contributed a great deal of input.

LIMESLINK

Cllr Powell reported that a meeting is to be held on 5^{th} August with an Open Meeting scheduled for 18^{th} September.

RURAL PRESERVATION SOCIETY

Cllr Powell reported that there are changes in the Disability Discrimination Act which will affect access into buildings for the disabled. This may have

implications for the Village shops. The Parish Council will take this new legislation into account when formulating the Strategic Plan for the Village. The notice board at The Bull PH is to be repaired.

THE VILLAGE ASSOCIATION

- Cllr Padfield reported that Hall bookings were very good which has put additional demands on the management team, who need more help in running the Hall. It is hoped to encourage more activities for youngsters in a joint initiative with the Parish Council.
- There is still outstanding snagging to be done at the Village Hall and the paving is to be relaid starting 5th August, as it was not laid according to specification. It is planned to install another ramp at a drop off point from the car park to enable easier access for wheelchair users. Further radiators may be added as there is insufficient heat in winter.

COPPED HALL TRUST

There will be an Open Day on 31st August 2003 from 11.00 a.m. until 4.30 p.m.

THEYDON BOIS PRIMARY SCHOOL

Cllr Gooch reported that an article had recently been published in the Guardian about the progress of the school in recent years. The SATS results were not yet available, The Head teacher, Mrs Bonds, was confident about the improving reputation of the school.

WAR MEMORIAL

Cllr Shales reported that the War Memorial was in need of an overhaul and enquiries were being made as to the possibility of obtaining a grant from the War Graves Commission, although this may prove difficult because although the church is listed, the memorial is not.

BRIEF GIVEN BY DISTRICT CLLR ROY NEWLAND ON THE BLUNTS FARM GOLF COURSE DEVELOPMENT

- Cllr Newland said that Epping Forest District Council had set up an Ad Hoc Committee to deal with the problems of Ongar Park and Blunts Farm Golf Courses. The Parish Council and the Rural Preservation Society had expressed considerable concern about the lorry movements pertaining to this development.
- The decision notice for planning permission had been given in 2002, after finalising a legal agreement, for the development of the site as a golf course, subject to a number of conditions requiring prior approval of details before the

commencement of the development. It had been agreed at the planning stage that in principle the Course should be constructed using imported material to create the contours and this could not now be reconsidered. However, it was considered reasonable to insist on further modifications to the submitted indicative earthworks plan to lessen importation and associated lorry movements. It was also considered that the estimation of quantities of imported materials should be checked against the approved drawings. Importation of hardcore onto the site had commenced and a substantial working area had been constructed which was in breach of the conditions and requirements of the legal agreement.

- Several other conditions to be satisfied prior to construction of the site had not been met.
- The Committee resolved to ensure that the requirements of the legal agreement and the conditions applied to the planning permission were applied vigorously and immediately, with any breach of the agreement and/or conditions being subject to appropriate action. If necessary, court proceedings to prevent excess lorry movements and the deposit of spoil on the site in excess of any importation materials specifically authorised.
- It had been noted that the work had now stopped.
- The Chairman thanked Cllr Newland for coming straight from a District Council meeting to the Parish Council meeting in order to speak on this topic.

SUSPENSION OF THE PARISH COUNCIL MEETING TO ALLOW LOCAL GOVERNMENT ELECTORS TO SPEAK ON ITEMS ON THE AGENDA AND OF LOCAL IMPORTANCE.

The following topics were raised by the Public:-

- Establish who owns scout hut site and look into the possibility of buying the land so it cannot be lost to development in future. See if there is a restrictive covenant on the land.
- Overhanging foliage on bridge coming from The Bull PH and on the opposite side from the bungalows in Thrifts Mead.
- The footpath from the end of the bridge to the cemetery is in poor condition due to road works.
- EFDC will be providing Electric Blanket Testing in the Village Hall on 4th September. Details on notice boards.
- The speakers at the meeting were not heard. The possibility of microphones should be looked into.
- A request for black sacks to be kept in the Parish Office for those who pick up litter, not just on litter pick days, but throughout the year. The Chairman thanked everyone who was involved in picking up litter in the Village.



Local History Recorder for Theydon Bois



The position of Local History Recorder in Theydon Bois, was established in November 1996 through the Parish Council as part of the Essex County Council Local History Recorder Scheme. Many villages in Essex now have a Recorder and those in this district are part of the Epping Group. The function of the Recorder is briefly:

To record, where possible, all noteworthy events in the village and present them in an annual chronicle or report to the County Co-

ordinator for retention by the Essex Record Office as part of the local history of the county. I have now written and forwarded six reports, which have been well received so a substantial record of current Theydon Bois history is now retained for posterity.

- To act as a village archivist and in this respect I keep a running, photographic, file
 of village buildings and events eg. the Wood and Krailing Development, the
 Millennium Celebrations and the opening of the new Village Hall. I also keep a
 further file of news cuttings published both locally and nationally, which relate to
 the village. Where possible I retain all leaflets of historical relevance eg. local
 election publicity literature.
- To act as a contact point for any enquiries relating to village history which cannot be dealt with by local historians such as Jack Farmer or Leslie Jerman.

My annual reports are quite substantial comprising an average of a hundred pages of text with some coloured illustrations, and make interesting reading. Each contains an extensive chronicle for each month, with specific details of some particular events included in a supporting topic; the Topics in the 2002 Report covered the Refurbishment of the Railway Viaduct, the Opening of the Garden of Remembrance, the Queen's Golden Jubilee Party, the proposed Tottenham Hotspur Football Academy and the affect of the increased rainfall on the local flora and fauna. Copies of the Reports, which are limited due to cost, are deposited with the Essex Record Office, the Theydon Bois Parish Council, the Theydon Bois Preservation Society and the Village Association. Most residents therefore have access to these Reports through those channels. However, it might be possible to provide further copies, preferably through particular village organisations, should this be necessary.

The Parish Council has been most helpful to me in my task. It has provided information when required and given financial support. The Parish Council is affiliated to the Friends of Historic Essex through the Local History Recorder.

Police Matters



Sunshine Crime Spree - Summer's here, the kids are at home & what do you do with them? It's hot, there's no breeze, and so every window in the house is open in an attempt to stay cool. That probably puts most people into a relaxed frame of mind, thoughts of barbecues, cool drinks & lazing in the back garden.

It's worth knowing now that there are some people out there that see this time of year as the ideal time to commit crime. Open windows mean open opportunities, easy access to your property. Think about it, we lock up at night; we set alarms, we lock cars. In the summer, at times, it seems just too hot to bother. Well be bothered please, Theydon Bois has experienced 6 house burglaries since the 18th July.

In the majority the houses have been entered by small open downstairs windows, in addition the houses have been on the West side of Theydon Bois. I believe that the person responsible may be walking or cycling the area looking for opportunities.

The descriptions given to police of two people disturbed at one of the burgled properties suggests that they were both white males, aged 20 - 30 yrs. One of them was about 5ft 8" tall with a local/London accent, was of medium build and had close cropped hair.

If you see anybody around your area that you are not happy about call the police on 01992 561212. Put us into a position to be able to check these people over. Remember police are on duty 24 hours a day & 7 says a week. **Remember never leave downstairs rooms vulnerable, when at home or when you go out.**

Essex Police - Special Constables - Through a new initiative Harlow Command Team will undertake that priority will be given to any Special Constable recruited through their local community, to provide regular patrols and a high visibility presence within that community.



A Special Constable dedicated to the Village would know what the problems were, who was causing them and when they occurred. Dealing with local issues, there may even be several people in the village who would like to provide this service to the community on a joint basis.

An applicant would have to measure up to the recruitment standards of the Special Constabulary, but if you are public spirited enough to assist the Police in providing additional local policing in Theydon Bois please contact the Parish Clerk on 01992 813442.



District Councillors Column

BLUNTS FARM GOLF COURSE DEVELOPMENT

We have become increasingly concerned that lorries have again started dropping spoil at this site, which has planning permission for development as a golf course. This was granted in April 2002 after some two years or so of negotiation of the details and planning conditions.

District Councillors have, in recent months, become aware that, where inadequate controls are in place, some golf course developments have been preceded by large scale land-fill before the golf course is actually constructed as the final stage. The Ongar Park Golf Course development is a prime example of this problem.

For this reason, a special Council committee, of which Roy Newland is a member, was formed to look at ways of avoiding the same problems on any future applications for such developments and to control, as far as circumstances allow, events on current approved schemes, such as Blunts Farm.

The recent dumping at Blunts Farm is not authorised, as there are conditions in the planning permission which have to be complied with before any development work can take place. As a result an urgent resolution was passed at a Council committee meeting held on 24th July that enforcement action would immediately be taken against the developers if work did not stop. **This was sufficient to bring the dumping to an immediate halt**. We will ensure that the developers continue to comply with the conditions to which their planning permission is subject and seek to avoid any excess land-fill as part of this development.

Diamond, Concrete and Swans



Tradition, and some of its publicity, asserts that the Rural Preservation Society was founded in 1943 and therefore should be celebrating its diamond jubilee this year. However it appears from the Society's first minute book that the inaugural meeting was in fact held in 1944, on 26 February, (in the British Restaurant) so the Society will be celebrating its golden jubilee next year. The first committee meeting was held on 9 March 1944 (Secretary B.J. Goodchild)

when affiliation to the Council for the Protection of Rural England (CPRE) was agreed.

Essex County Council Refuse Tip, Luxborough Lane

All householders should now be aware that Essex County Council have introduced a PROOF OF RESIDENCE within Epping Forest at the Council Tip, Luxborough Lane, Chigwell. There is now a requirement to produce a Community Tax Bill or Driving Licence or Utilities Bill to security personnel (positioned at the entrance of the site) to gain entry.

Failure to do so will incur a cost of £3 to enter the site, although a refund can be obtained from Essex County Council, Chelmsford, on production of a receipt, which will be issued by the security personnel. The reason for this is to recoup the cost of handling non-Essex residents' waste. At present there is not a similar requirement at any other site but it is recommended to be prepared by carrying some form of residential evidence before setting off to dispose of any rubbish.

Essex County Council has issued a Public Notice a copy of which is held by Madeleine Murphy, Parish Clerk. A copy can be obtained at the Luxborough Lane site or by telephoning the Waste and Recycling Helpline on 01245 491222.

The End of Country Dancing in Theydon Bois?

In a recent issue of the Village News the history of the Theydon Bois Country Dance Club, stretching over 50 years, was recounted.

The Club starts its end of year session on 30 September and there will be a dance at 7.30 every Tuesday in the Village Hall until 9 December, with the exception of 21 October when the hall is needed for another purpose.

Unfortunately, this could be the last session of the Club because its support is dwindling. There is a solid core of about a dozen members who attend regularly but their devotion is not enough to keep the club financially viable.

Over the past three years the current committee have tried everything to increase the membership by having live music, outside callers and even demonstrations of belly dancing! Although the numbers might go up for special occasions they sink back again in the following weeks.

The Club has received grants but the larger grants cannot be used for the biggest expense which is hiring the hall. The money for this has to come from the members and if there are not enough members, the Club cannot survive.

So a facility in the Village for people aged from 8 to 80, which has a very friendly atmosphere and provides a very enjoyable way to exercise, with refreshments in the interval, is in desperate need of support or it must close.

Neighbourhood Watch

Recently, I have received several calls from villagers worried about being contacted by telephone from firms saying that Representatives will be in the area the next day, and offering to pay a visit to examine or advise on fire and/or crime prevention precautions.

Whilst I have no knowledge of any crime having been committed, I have heard of people being persuaded to part with large sums of money in exchange for unsuitable products. If you do deal with security firms do make sure that they are reputable and registered. Please be aware that neither the police nor the fire service 'tout' for business. It is up to you, the householder to contact the appropriate authority for advice if needed, and you can contact our Crime Prevention Officer, Tony Ellis at Epping Police station who will be pleased to help.

A few wise precautions are:-

- 1. Avoid telling unknown telephone callers anything about yourself.
- 2. If the person claims to have misdialled and asks for your number, do not give it.
- 3. If you have reason to be worried by a phone call, contact the Police.
- 4. NEVER, EVER tell the caller of your movements each day (it has been done).

Whilst on the subject of telephones, not a lot of people know that you can stop unsolicited phone calls from firms selling everything from windows to insurance.

It is called the Telephone Preference Service, and registration is free.

Those who want to block cold callers should simply phone 0845 070 0707. Refer to page 1:4 in the Telephone Directory.

Companies which flout this service will be fined by the Data Protection Registrar.

Copies of the 2003/2004 Harlow Divisional Policing Plan are now available from me or Epping Police station.

The plan gives the policing objectives for the next year, and also information about the staffing of the Division.

On a more personal note, I still require volunteers from Slade End to deliver the Neighbourhood Watch letter, twice a year. Not too onerous a task, especially if two or more people apply.



COUNTY CLLR JANET WHITEHOUSE

The most noticeable county activity has been the strengthening and refurbishment of the bridge over the railway. This is being undertaken in six discrete stages, two of which have now been completed. These are the "above deck works" which were completed in October 2002 and the "country-side below deck works" which were completed in July 2003. Because of budgetary constraints and the need to carry out more urgent works elsewhere in the county the next stages will be programmed in the five year construction programme starting in 2006.

The County Council, along with all except small councils, has been forced by government legislation to adopt new structures. In place of the traditional committees there is now a cabinet of portfolio holders who are the main decision takers. Other councillors have a scrutiny and policy development role and also serve on their Area Forum.

In May 2002 the first meeting of the West Essex Area Forum was held. The West Essex Area consists of Epping Forest, Harlow, Brentwood and Uttlesford and meetings rotate around these districts. The original intention of the forum was to bring the county council nearer to residents and enable them to meet their councillors and hear issues relevant to their area discussed. However the main value of the forum appears to be as a meeting place for representatives of the district councils, parish councils, primary care trusts and police to meet with the local county councillors to discuss issues of common concern. Members of the public are welcome to attend but the publicity for the meetings has been poor. The next meeting is on Friday 19 September in Brentwood.

Much time has been spent at the Area Forum and at Council meetings discussing the proposals for the expansion of Stansted Airport, the Harlow Options Study and other planning proposals which impact on the area. County planning officers have worked very hard and much consultation has taken place with many stakeholders. Essex County Council has formed a coalition with Hertfordshire County Council and East Herts District Council to campaign against the building of new runways in the South (continued on page 24)

East of England. A brochure which summarises the key arguments is available (tel: 01245 430022) or via the home page of the ECC website (www.essexcc.gov.uk).

The Planning and Compulsory Purchase Bill was published in December 2002 which proposes reforms to the planning system. The county council has expressed its opposition to this bill as it reduces democratic accountability and concentrates strategic planning powers in a non-elected regional body. The majority of expertise in strategic planning is in county councils but this bill removes their statutory role.

Highways maintenance has been discussed at the Area Forum and one issue was the gritting of roadways and pavements in icy weather. Gritting pavements has long been a concern of mine but my suggestions to the district council have been unsuccessful because of legal concerns.. With regard to the provision of grit bins the county officer said that parish councils can request grit bins and so long as the gritting is done on an adhoc basis there would be no liability. I will ask the parish council to discuss this.

Issues relating to travellers have been of concern in Epping Forest district. The Forum had a presentation from the Gypsy Service Manager who said that Essex accommodates over 200 families on county owned permanent sites. However there has been an increase in the number of travellers/gypsies purchasing their own land and settling on it before obtaining planning permission. New government legislation is expected.

I am a member of the Community Care Policy Development Group and I have been on panels reviewing the services for older people, services for people with learning difficulties, and services for people with sensory and physical disabilities. I am also on the panel that meets with the Board of the North Essex Mental Health Partnership NHS Trust. As a member of the Health Overview and Scrutiny Committee I am about to be involved in a study of health services for disabled children and children who need the child and adolescent mental health services.
