New email address

Harlow Division police officers now have a new generic email address for people making enquiries specific to the division, which includes Harlow, Brentwood, Epping, Loughton and Waltham Abbey. The facility is to enable people to communicate with their local police through means other than telephone and post, and is to be used to provide feedback and information or ask non-urgent questions.

It is NOT a facility for crime reporting. The mailbox is checked regularly and emails forwarded on to the relevant individual department for a response so it's always helpful where possible to include the name of the person the information is directed at.

Message in a bottle

The scheme seeks to address problems frequently encountered when entry is made by emergency service personnel to an elderly, vulnerable or any person taking specific medication home. If they are found collapsed it can save valuable time in finding essential medical information or next of kin details as often these details are not readily at hand. The scheme provides a plastic container which allows you to put these essential details therein, you then keep this information in the door of your refrigerator. The purpose of keeping it in the refrigerator is that most homes will have one and for this to work, all containers within the scheme need to be kept in the same location. Additionally, if there is a fire, the fridge will provide some degree of protection to the container and it may be possible to recover the details afterwards. In order to highlight to the emergency services, be it police, fire or ambulance, that the scheme is in operation, a green sticker in the form of a cross will be placed on the inside of the front door or on a nearby wall or panel in a prominent position. Similarly a sticker will be placed on the door of the fridge.

'Message in a Bottle' is sponsored by Neighbourhood Watch and information about the scheme is available from them, your Crime Reduction Officer or from Chris on the mobile rural police office.

He wandered up to the vehicle with the intention of warning her about this type of car theft. He couldn't believe his eyes - inside the car was a sleeping baby. He was shocked and decided to stand guard, frightened to

leave the vehicle, just in case. He stood there for twenty minutes, no exaggeration, he timed it.

In the end, thinking that something had happened to the mother, he went into the shop, she was talking. The mother was horrified when the error of her ways was pointed out to her. She thought she had locked the car with the baby inside.

Please - just a little bit of thought might save you a great deal of distress.

Just ring 01279-641212 and ask for them by name. You can of course come and talk to me. You must also consider the items that you keep in your shed, last year one person lost a stamp collection.

Televisions

With the number of plasma and flat screen televisions now in use they seem to be a target for burglars. In recent years televisions and videos have not been taken in dwelling burglaries, but with the new style plasma and flat screens they are now easier to carry and are of a greater value.

With that in mind, you should make a note of the model and serial number and property mark such items in some way. I have a number of FREE ultra violet marking pens on board for your use.

Mobile Phones

Many of you are updating your mobile phones with the new camera/video type. There was even an article in The Daily Telegraph the other day about attaching these types of phones to your dog so that you can find your lost dog!! I just hope nobody took that article seriously.

If you dial *#06# (Star, Hash, Zero, Six, Hash) this will show you your serial number. Make a note of this at home. You can also mark your postcode inside the cover. I will do this for you if you so wish.

Untaxed Motor Vehicles

I have recently made you all aware of how to report motor vehicles being used without road tax. All that was required was vehicles registration number (Index Number), Make, model, colour and any details of the owner that you might have. I made a mistake, though. I forgot to tell you that these vehicles must be in use on the road and not just parked up in someone's garden.

The vehicle tax is for vehicles that use the road. If the vehicle is parked up untaxed on the highway then we can deal with it but if it is used but kept on private property then the DVLC or we have to catch it on the road. A lot of people keep vehicles parked up unused on their property for various reasons, spare parts or with the intention of working on them in the future. They are therefore not in use on the road and do not require road tax.

Can I just remind you again about buying these because you have no way of knowing their history and once they have been involved in an accident it may well have damage that can't be detected and therefore could lead to your child being hurt. This has become an issue and it is well worth thinking about it if you intend buying one. Any knocks or cracks will be detrimental to its use.

Therefore, its true history has to be known to you - and trusted. Also, the webbing on the five point fixing harness should be closely examined for wear.

The very experienced Lynda Hague, Road Safety Officer at Epping Forest District Council, is your first point of call. She is well worth talking to.

Make sure your bag is zipped up and with you at all times. Even better still, put your handbag across your shoulders with the bag in front of you for added security.

It's time to remind ourselves again why the burglar sees Spring as his friend. It's a time when everybody is enjoying their gardens. It is also time to air the house and car. The doors are left wide open and every window, which is capable of being opened, is flung to its full extent. At these times, even the car is not immune to lapses in security. Windows are wound down and the sunroof never closes.

The burglar welcomes this time of year. He is an opportunist by nature. To him, hot days and warm evenings signal rich pickings.

Last year we suffered a string of burglaries committed in the late evenings or early mornings. On each occasion, the thief only had to reach through an open ground floor window to steal. In some instances, he went into houses through open windows and open patio doors. Forget what he stole for a moment; imagine one of your family coming face to face with him in your home.

The thief is well aware of the Englishman's behavioural habits. He can see where you are and more to the point, he can see where you are not. It's a simple matter and a calculated risk for him to slip in, steal something valuable and slip out again in a matter of seconds.

Their ingenuity knows no bounds. A youngster knocks on your front door. He or she says," My ball has gone over into your garden", or even, "My rabbit has got out and I think it's got into your garden". Being of a kind nature, you go to search for the missing item leaving the front door open. It is not easy when your eyesight will not focus on these numbers, it is also strange and unnerving so please be patient with them. Thanks.

Buying motor vehicles

We can't resist a bargain can we? It must be inbred, if we think we can save a few bob then we will take the chance. Some people will buy anything 'Marked Down' I know someone who returned home the other day with an escalator!! Only joking, seriously though.

So many of you are getting caught out with buying second hand motor vehicles that I felt I must warn you again. I know of two people this year that have handed over cash for vehicles and have lost both vehicle and cash because the vehicle was in fact stolen. I also know of another man who was going to pay £8,000 to an unknown male in a car park on The Isle of Dogs. He was also going to travel there and deal with this person alone.

If you do not know anything about vehicles then seek help from a someone who does, even groups like the AA or RAC.

Don't agree to meet strangers in way out places and you really must take care, you should always have somebody with you. PLUS - Do not hand car keys over so they can have a test drive - do not take cash either. Don't laugh because people do. They are told it is cheaper if they bring cash, so people do!!

You should check with the previous owner, check the mileage on old MOTs and check the registration number on the tax disc against the front and back Plates.

Get somebody who knows what they are doing to check it. So many vehicles are brought in from abroad and then have stolen plates put on them.
